

*In view of reports of a potential £2 billion funding gap in children's services by 2020 and concerns regarding increased dependence on unstable sources of funding, how can the Government address concerns about the impact on service provision for vulnerable children, particularly in terms of the future of early intervention services? With Ofsted's finding that strong leadership is vital for improvement in children's services, how can barriers to developing high-quality leadership, including a lack of professional development, be overcome? How can data - such as predictive analytics - be best used to support efficient and effective decision making by commissioners and front-line professionals, and what examples of best practice exist? Following the announcement of funding for a second wave of projects under the Children's Social Care Innovation Fund, what can be learnt from the first round of evaluations - such as in service integration and mobilising leadership at all levels - that could be translated into lessons for other contexts and what should be the policy priorities for the future of the programme?*
