Stakeholder perspectives on the content of the proposed Computing curriculum. Since the ICT curriculum was withdrawn in 2012, how much progress has there been in developing a 'wiki curriculum'? Does the proposed Programme of Study (PoS) for Key Stages 1 and 2 cover the basic computing skills required of pupils in preparation for secondary school; would there be a benefit in introducing a computer-literacy test alongside SATs? Does the introduction of programming and other more rigorous computer skills meet the needs of further study and industry? Is the PoS flexible enough to accommodate rapid technological innovation? To what extent will the new curriculum encourage children to engage with computer science as intended? Should lessons in online safety be compulsory in all schools including Academies?
