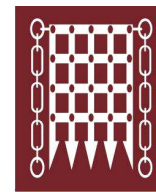

In light of the ageing population, is a universal SPA linked to life expectancy sustainable in the long-term; if so, what proportion of a person's adult life is it reasonable to expect them to work for - otherwise should weight be given to regional and social variance in life-expectancy, and healthy life-expectancy, as called for by the TUC? What are the broader challenges for addressing the gap in perceptions on reasonable retirement ages and levels of pension contribution; could further changes yet be made to the auto-enrolment system to address this? In light of the recommendations of the Cridland review, does the Government need to look again at the long-term viability of the state pension Triple-Lock; would removing the 2.5% increase be sufficient? Is there more the pensions industry can do to support those groups who rely most on the state pension - carers, the self-employed, people with disabilities, ethnic minorities and women?

How can Government best support those older workers with caring responsibilities? What effect could a 'hard Brexit' have on the quality and length of working lives in the UK? Would steps such as introducing age-blind recruitment practices have a positive effect on the number of older workers being hired, and if so should Government legislate to this effect?
