How might Government and local authorities help schools to alleviate budgetary constraints caused by rising costs in national insurance, staff wages and the lack of increases in school funding? In light of the expected further rise of demand for pupil places in the primary sector, how can schools be supported to meet the demand for places and maintain a high standard of provision amidst rising costs and funding constraints? What examples of best practice are emerging for local authorities to prioritise education spending to meet specific needs and requirements in their localities? What impact has the splitting of the Dedicated Schools Grant into three funding units - covering schools, early years and high-needs funding for pupils that require additional resources - had in simplifying and making school funding allocations fairer? Has the additional £390 million funding allocated for the least fairly-funded areas helped address disparities in funding between regions?
