#### 9.55 - 10.45 Key Stage 4 performance table reform: the impact on schools and pupils

Will Government's reforms to performance measures at Key Stage 4 succeed in focusing schools' attention on the achievement of all pupils, and reduce the pressure on the C/D borderline? How well do the reformed performance tables reflect pupils' progress in all subjects; will the move towards focusing on progress measures over 'raw' attainment measures provide valuable information to schools and parents? What might be the impact of the proposed introduction of a requirement for schools to publish performance measures on their website using a data application; is this measure likely to improve parents' ability to compare local providers? How valid are concerns that stricter floor standards will demotivate teaching professionals in schools that now fall below them? What impact will double-weighting English and Maths GCSEs, and the retention of the EBacc as a performance measure, have on subject entry patterns and on schools' allocation of teaching time and resources? How will only counting a student's first GCSE entry for a subject in school performance tables affect decisions on early entry; what will be the likely effect on students' eventual grades? What impact will making all Level 2 vocational qualifications equal in weight to a single GCSE have on entries in these qualifications? Will the revised performance tables and grading system be sufficiently clear to help parents make decisions on applying to secondary schools?

To what extent will proposals for a 'regional commissioner' system of oversight allay fears around a lack of 'middle tier' accountability for non-maintained free schools; what other options could be explored? How far has Parent View succeeded in enabling parents to hold schools to account; is there a need for local authorities to be given greater powers to intervene more directly in academies and free schools? Will efforts to recruit more school governors with particular skills improve the professionalism and effectiveness of governing bodies, and what further training and professional development could be provided?
