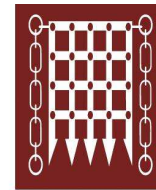

What steps could be taken to address resourcing and procurement issues faced by schools when purchasing modern equipment, including the availability of advice and qualified personnel? What could be done to improve professional development of teachers so that it enables them to share best practice and make effective use of modern technology in the classroom? In light of concerns raised about access to new technology, including costs to disadvantaged households and the lack of access to high speed broadband in rural and other areas, what could be done to reduce inequalities? Should more schools consider the use of adopting initiatives such as Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) to widen access and overcome access issues, particularly those faced by pupils from disadvantaged backgrounds? How can schools be supported to overcome challenges including online security concerns, legal issues and access in the home to devices when implementing such initiatives? Should a school's use of technology across the curriculum be reflected in Ofsted ratings as proposed by ETAG?
