What can be learnt from the uptake so far of the new Tech levels and Applied General Qualifications introduced last year? Will the new Technical Awards fulfil Government's aim of improving young people's practical skills? In what ways can staff be supported to deliver these new qualifications, particularly occupationally specific qualifications such as the new Technical Certificates which require industry knowledge? How can employers and universities become more involved in the design of new qualifications, and delivery of existing ones, to ensure that they meet their needs and adequately prepare young people? What could be done to make sure parents, students and employers understand the differences between the increased variety of vocational qualifications on offer, and differences in their rigour and purposes? How can Government address criticisms that changes to 16-19 funding - providing a standard funding rate of 600 guided learning hours per learner - has resulted in colleges not being able to offer pupils a range of qualifications requiring a large number of guided learning hours? What impact has the new progress 8 accountability measure and the more rigorous league tables had on the choice of qualifications on offer and how they are taught in schools?
