# Session Chair's opening remarks Baroness Barker, Liberal Democrat Lords LGBT Spokesperson

Thank you very much, good morning everybody.

I would draw your attention to the title of this seminar, it is next steps for transgender equality, inclusion, rights and services. Today is not a place in which the existence of trans people is up for question or debate, and if that is what you have come to do, then I'm afraid you are in the wrong place.

We meet today in a place which is mourning people who are victims of hate a year ago. What we are here to do today is to talk about the process of transgender equality, how it will happen, not if it will happen or whether it should happen.

We are not Channel 4, today is not going to be a circus. So if you want to stay and take part in this debate then you are entitled to do so provided that you treat everybody in this room with equal respect, and as long as you do that you will be treated with respect yourself. If you don't you will be made to leave. Does anybody not understand any part of that? Fine. You are now in a contract with everybody else in the room, and if you violate you will be asked to leave.

We are in a place where yesterday we reflected on what division and hatred and otherness can do. The transgender community is a visible community, is on the receiving end of that otherness more than any other, and therefore it is, I think, to the great respect of our present Government that they have chosen to seek to remedy a lot of the sources of that hatred and that otherness, and that they intend to do so in a quite considerate and deliberative way.

We are very lucky this morning to have with us Ollie Entwistle who is Head of LGBT Policies at the Government Equalities Office, for several months he's had a wet towel around his head while he looks at the results of the LGBT consultation, and I'm sure he is going to tell you about that, and he will also tell you about what is intended in the coming months for the next steps toward changing the administrative procedure of gender recognition. # Session Chair's closing remarks Baroness Barker, Liberal Democrat Lords LGBT Spokesperson

I am going to conclude this section by making the observation that 30 years ago our Parliament passed Section 28. Those of us who have lived under legislation that deems us to be lesser people I believe have a duty to make sure that nobody else has to live under the unfairness to which we were subjected in all those days.
